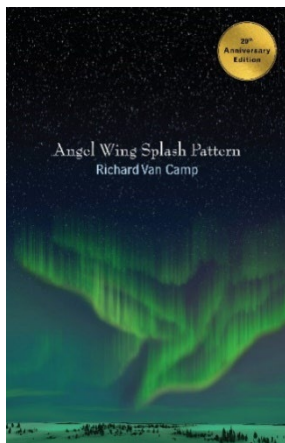

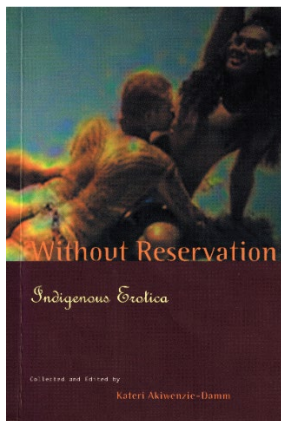

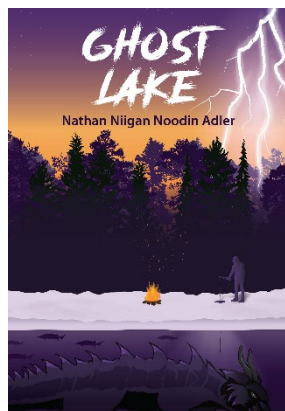

Ghost Lake is a collection of short horror, paranormal, and thriller fiction based in Anishinaabe legend, history, and contemporary experience. Set in and around the fictional northern Ontario reserve of Ghost Lake, the book follows the stories of an interconnected cast of characters and their brushes with the supernatural, creatures of Ojibwe cosmology, the Spirit World, and with monsters, both human and otherwise. In Adler's skilled prose we find that the precolonial past is not so distant, that history informs the present, and nothing is ever truly lost or destroyed because the land remembers. *Ghost Lake* was the 2021 winner of the Indigenous Voices Award for English Fiction.

Like its predecessor in the series, *Serpents and Other Spiritual Beings* represents a vital contribution to the preservation of Indigenous story, culture and history.
